


The Art of Fielding by Chad Harbach


Fenway 1912 by Glenn Stout

Blockade Billy by Stephen King



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A native of Holyoke, Joe has lived in Northampton for the past 21 years. He and his wife have 3 daughters, the youngest of whom is a senior at Northampton High School. He works as an educator for the Massachusetts Nurses Association, which necessitates a great deal of travel for him, teaching members about labor law, negotiating contracts, and so forth. He also teaches several weeks during the year at the National Labor College in Maryland and has taught at the Labor Center at the University of Massachusetts.

Non-fiction is Joe's favorite for reading. With an academic background in East Asian studies, he likes to read Chinese history, but he says American history, biography, and history of all kinds interest him as well. He reports that after only his first meeting with the library's trustees, he was impressed by the seriousness with which the board takes its responsibilities. 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answer: "Who needs libraries? We all do!" That appeared on the cover of the Legislative Agenda, part of the packet given to attendees.

The purpose of the morning is to offer a forum to highlight the value of our public libraries in Western Massachusetts and look at the issues affecting them today. It's been six years since the Forbes hosted the event.

Forbes Library Director, Janet Moulding opened the program and introduced the speakers. Other opening remarks came from vice-president of the Board of Trustees, Peter Rowe, and Mayor David Narkewicz.

We were reminded that these library resources have been and are hard-won. John Scibak of the second Hampshire District spoke passionately about how in a time of budget cuts to the libraries and library system, he encouraged all of us to be proud that we have stood up for the needs of libraries in Western Massachusetts and for making those needs known.

Some stories the speakers told were very personal. Bill Dwight, President of the Northampton City Council regaled and amused the attendees with the story of Pleasant Street Video, and how the library came to add the store's inventory to its own collection.

Susan Stinson, Writer-in-Residence at Forbes told a story of her experience as a literacy tutor, bringing her student to the library amazed at the resources available to one and all.

These resources were highlighted by other speakers who noted that libraries were more than just books. Libraries serve communities as a space for learning, lectures, art, as well as access to technology, and a much-needed resource for job seekers in a time of economic downturn.

Some of those libraries may be in small communities that are too small to provide services on their own. Those communities have a friend in another speaker, Bonnie Isman, from the Western Massachusetts Library Advocates (WMLA). She spoke of the unique needs of Western Massachusetts with so many communities in need of the library services.

The WMLA advocates support for the legislative agenda of supporting the funding of the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC).

The MBLC uses state and federal funding to supply library services such as interlibrary loan services, programs, books, DVDs and E-books, services for the blind, internet services, databases and electronic resources that can be used for research.

Other speakers who addressed the concerns of Western Massachusetts libraries included Greg Pronevitz, of the Mass Library System; Sharon Sharry of C/WMARS, Central/ Western Massachusetts Automated Resource Sharing.

Other invited guests and speakers included Representatives Ellen Story, Stephen Kulik, Peter Kocot, and Paul Mark. Senator Stanley Rosenberg was unable to attend, but sent his aide Tom Mitchell to be part of the event.
